BI-WEEKLY YARD WASTE COLLECTION RESUMES

Yard waste collection for 2016 resumes February 29. Residents may begin placing yard waste cans out for collection along with their regular garbage the week of February 29. If you put yard waste in your bin during the winter be sure to loosen the material so it is not packed in the bottom of the bin. Drivers shake the bins when emptying them, but material that is lodged in the bottom may not fall out if it has been sitting too long.

Helpful tips and reminders for yard waste collection:

- Yard waste bins are emptied every other week from March-November.
- Be sure to put bins out at the curb by 6:00 a.m. Yard waste routes run at different times than garbage routes. Call-backs for service when the bin is not out cost the resident \$12 each time.

- Prop the lid of the container open a small bit to keep the smell down.
- Place dry woody material, such as sticks, at the bottom to keep the grass from sticking.
- Mulch whenever possible to reduce the amount of grass.
- Store the container in a shady area, if possible.
- Do not bag yard waste.

The City of Richland is committed to providing quality service to our residents. If your garbage pickup was missed, please call our office by noon the next day at 942-7700, option 1.

Please note: This year our collection drivers may start routes earlier than you are used to so please have all containers at the curb by 6:00am on your scheduled day.

WE CAN ACCEPT

- Leaves
- Grass
- Hedge clippings/light brush
- Small limbs or branches less than 4 inches in diameter and 4 feet in length
- Seed pods, including pine cones
- Straw/hay and bamboo

NO we can't accept

Yard trimmings mixed with trash or miscellaneous materials, such as:



- Plastic/clay pots
- Dirt, rocks, sod or sand
- Metal wire or fencing
- Glass, pottery or stone

Rich-land Compost

In 2015 Richland residents recycled 4,238 tons of yard waste through the curbside green bin program. Another 3,842 tons of yard waste was self-hauled to the compost facility from businesses and other residential customers. Compost generated from the Horn Rapids Compost Facility was used around the City for projects such as the reseeding at Columbia Playfields and the re-vegetation at Amon Basin.



LANDFILL SURVEY: MARCH 1-31

The Horn Rapids Landfill is conducting a survey of users during the month of March to gather information about residential and commercial use of the landfill. The city plans to use this information to direct future programs and services at the landfill. Landfill users will be given a survey when they visit the landfill during the month of March.

Hauling Trash? Be Prepared!

Selecting, packing and hauling trash to the landfill is no easy task. But proper planning ensures you have a good experience. If in doubt, look at the landfill's webpage by going to www.ci.richland.wa.us/solidwaste.

On the webpage you will find helpful information, such as packing tips, videos, fees, business hours and location.

Be sure to cover and secure all trash and yard debris prior to travel.

Based on City Ordinance, title 15.08.150: Items MUST be secured to the vehicle or an additional fee may be charged before disposal. Debris blowing out of vehicles litters our roadways and environment. Please use extra precautions to ensure your debris stays put. Use a tarp, flattened cardboard or heavy plastic and tie it securely.

Tips for Easy Collection

Follow these tips to make your weekly collection smooth and easy.

- Be sure to place your cans at least 3 feet from each other and cars or other obstructions.
- Be sure cars are not parked too close to your cans and are parallel to the curb.
- Bag all garbage in the gray garbage can be sure to tie the bags
 to prevent blowing garbage as the can is dumped. Residents are
 responsible for garbage that blows out of their cans if not secured
 properly. Recyclables for the Blue can may be bagged in paper bags but
 don't use plastic bags as they damage sorting equipment.
- If you don't have a full can of garbage on windy days, consider waiting until the following week to put your cans out for collection.

Energy Services Maintains Trees around Power Lines

When trees grow into power lines, they create a safety hazard for line crews and can cause power outages. Richland Energy Services' tree trimming program helps keep trees out of power lines. Crews use a systematic way to trim the entire service area about once every three years. You can help us by reporting tree and power line interferences to PowerOperations@ci.richland. wa.us.


Sometimes trees grow into power lines and need to be removed and replaced with a properly sized tree. Our certified arborist will visit with you to assess the next steps.

Plant the Right Trees in the Right Place

- Consider tree size and shape when fully grown.
- Plant trees away from overhead and underground power lines.
- Plant trees away from your home to avoid damage to the sides, roof, and foundation.
- Plant deciduous trees on the west side of a house to provide cooling shade in summer and warming daylight in winter as they lose leaves.
- Plant evergreens on the north side of your home to block icy winter winds.
